 - OHA - LEAD & COPPER, ADDT'L & CONTINUAL REGULATIONS
- WILLAMETTE RIVER-DEQ: PFA'S, GARBAGE, MERCURY, TEMPERATURE
- SFHA/FEMA – PICM REQUIREMENTS WITH LOSS OF FEDERAL FUNDING RAMIFICATIONS

Waterlines: 23.2 Miles. (73% PVC pipe, 16% cast iron, 10% asbestos cement) No lead lines!

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Roads: 32.24 lane miles streets



Facilities: City Hall; Gazebo & Public Restrooms; Harrisburg Municipal Center (Library, Council/Court Chambers) & 2 small office buildings housing the Senior Center & HART Community Center Non-Profit; Heritage Park Museum Grounds (7 Buildings); PW Water Shop (6) Buildings; Wastewater Facility (3) Buildings, (4) Sewer Lagoons, (62) Acres of Poplar Trees; Post Office & ½ Fire Station Parking Lots; numerous outbuildings-holding wells, storm & water lift stations, etc.



Wastewater Lines: 63,000' of gravity sewers & manholes, 5 raw sewage pump stations, 9,400' of force mains, and 7,775' of main pressure line from main pump station to treatment facility.



Parks: 8 Parks, 132.58 Acres (Eagle Park, partially developed) (Tadpole Park, undeveloped)



Businesses: 60 Commercial/Industrial, 15 (Licensed) Home Occupations



Streets Improved since 2017: Kesling (1st to 2nd), Moore (1st to 3rd), Monroe St (1st to 2nd), Smith St (1st to 3rd St.), 5th St., (Kesling to LaSalle), S. 9th St. Extension (LaSalle to Sommerville Loop), 2nd St. (Smith to Macy St.), Macy St. (2nd to 3rd) S. 6th St., (Smith to Kesling)

Surface Water: 44,520 piped storm water, 37,100' of open ditch
